1. RATIONALE:

Generalist social workers are facing increased demands to use evidence-based practice procedures and demonstrate the effectiveness of their own practice. This course in research methods prepares students to use empirically based knowledge and to evaluate their own practice. Students need to learn quantitative and qualitative research methods to conduct and evaluate evidence-based practice.

5. PREREQUISITE REQUIREMENTS:

a. INSIDE: GED or High School Diploma. Preference given to those with some college.

b. OUTSIDE: Junior or Senior Standing. Preference given to Social Work majors.

6. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course in research methods prepares students to use empirically based knowledge and to evaluate their own practice. This course teaches students to develop qualitative and quantitative research designs that examine need, monitor interventions, and assess outcomes in generalist practice. Students learn how to evaluate existing empirical literature that pertains to specific practice topics for diverse atrisk populations. Ethical issues germane to social work research are stressed throughout the course.

7. COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Understand and apply existing research studies to social work practice using critical thinking skills.
- 2. Understand the primary concepts and skills utilized in qualitative and quantitative social work research methods.
- 3. Design research projects that assess need, monitor interventions, and assess outcomes in generalist practice, including strategies that attend to human diversity and address the needs of populations at risk.
- 4. Understand and apply social work values and ethics in the evaluation and research of social work practice.
- 5. To understand the relationships between research and practice, distinguishing between the use of research in evidence-based practice and the use of research to evaluate social work practice.

8. STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- a. Pose a question and conduct an electronic search to identify existing empirical studies that identify evidence for a specific social work practice topic.
- Analyze empirical studies for quality and relevance to a practice topic using critical thinking skills.
- c. Demonstrate an understanding of primary research concepts and skills through the accurate use of terminology in specific research designs.
- d. Construct research designs that assess social work practice phases (assessing need, monitoring intervention, assessing outcome) for populations at risk and/or some aspect of human diversity.
- e. Formulate a human subjects worksheet and informed consent form in accordance with the ethical research practices of the profession for one of the above research designs.
- f. Demonstrate understanding of the use of evidence for specific aspects of generalist practice by critically analyzing empirical studies.
- g. Demonstrate understanding of the use of research to evaluate one's social work practice.
- 9. MODES OF INSTRUCTION: Lectures, class discussion and small group exercises and project.

10. REQUIRED READING:

Research Articles (one per class): Photocopies of all articles will be provided by the instructor.
